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Downs Steam: One of Toowoomba's Top Attractions

Downs Steam Tourist Railway is currently ranked #8 in the top 25 "things to do" in Toowoomba.

According to the world's largest travel website and mobile phone app "Trip Advisor", which bases its rankings on reviews submitted by users, our vast collection of carriages and rail memorabilia, especially the Dreamtime Coach, keeps Downs Steam high on the list of Toowoomba's most popular draw cards.

The overwhelmingly positive reviews on the site were full of praise with one visitor calling it "one of Toowoomba's best kept secrets" and another writing of the Dreamtime Carriage: "I honestly don't think I've been so emotional about a train."

DownsSteam life-member Peter Eldridge would love to see the ranking rise even higher.

With progress towards our first carriages carrying paying tourists along the main line edging ever closer, this month we've purchased another two first-class sleeper cars including a "composite car" with accommodation for staff working on the planned overnight trips, as well as an office.

The latest acquisitions, from Queensland Rail's Sunlander and Inlander services, will be transported from QR's Ipswich storage sheds to Drayton by road later this month.

These will almost complete the fleet of carriages needed to begin overnight trips to Stanthorpe by next April, after the December arrival of the two first-class sleepers, one club car and one lounge car kindly donated by QR.

The next step comes mid-July when a bold band of volunteers will put the carriages through their paces during a Saturday night "sleepover" to ensure the beds are comfortable and the airconditioning and hot water systems can cope with the demand.

Meantime, Peter and his team are working on costings and designing package deals for the trips and fine tuning the online booking system.



PROJECT 106 The Pride of Toowoomba

C16-106 has seen a steady amount of work over the last few months. Work has continued on the axle-boxes with four out of eight axle boxes completed. The next two require minor machining at a reduced cost and the final set will require re-babbitting. The funding for these works is the main focus and priority for Project 106 as the sooner this is done, the sooner we can lower 106 back onto its driving wheels. We can then recommence work on the boiler after moving it into the shed out of the weather for protection.

The Project 106 fundraising program has raised a continuous and helpful amount of funds towards C16-106 progressing. Project manager Andrew Caldwell would like to thank all those who have made contributions and would like to encourage all members to contribute what they can, from five cents, to working on the locomotive itself. Why note pledge a cup of coffee a week? A small contribution over a long time can make a huge difference to our progress. Let's get this significant steam locomotive back on it wheels and closer to completion.

All work on C16-106 is working towards reuniting the mainframe with the driving wheels and lowering the main frames off the concrete blocks. The locomotive needs to be trammelled, this is when the driving wheels are set perpendicular to the connecting rod, set parallel to each other and set at the exact coupling rod spacing. This is a critical and important stage, because if not done correctly the axle-boxes, coupling and connecting rod bushes will run hot and wear excessively.

The boiler has finally been rescued and placed on a new cradle built by Bob, this will allow the boiler to be inspected and placed into dry storage in preparation for future works. The long-term intention is to build a platform around the boiler to allow for the significant amount of work required while ensuring safety for those who carry it out.

Slashing our Power Bills with the Help of the Sun

Very soon, the plaintive cry of "for goodness sake, turn off the lights" will no longer be heard echoing around the buildings of Downs Steam, thanks to a set of 32 solar panels recently installed on the shed roof.

With the help of a \$28,000 grant from the Queensland Gambling Community Fund and Paul Lemming at Excel Solar, the panels were raised and put in place last month. All that's needed now is for Ergon to install some additional equipment in an adjacent junction box and Downs Steam will start to see its power bills plummet.

Until now, the almost constant welding work in the main shed, coupled with the energy demands of the catering equipment and airconditioning has attracted some hefty bills.

But with solar power significantly impacting on the volume of electricity drawn from the grid, its expected bills will be slashed by around 70 percent.

OPERATIONAL TRAINING REPORT – May 2016

It is important that members are aware of DownsSteam's obligations when it comes to the training and maintenance of the knowledge and skills required to perform the duties of specific roles required to run an operational railway.

Before we can operate a passenger tourist train, every volunteer working in an operational capacity requires a level of competency in the tasks required by that role.

For example, a volunteer Carriage Attendant working directly with our customers will require different skills when compared to a volunteer Train Driver, who will obviously need a more detailed skill-set.

DownsSteam's Operational Training Program aims to achieve this by providing **all** members with an opportunity to acquire the knowledge vital for a specific role prior to operations commencing.

If you're keen to assist directly with our operations, then **NOW** is the time to start learning!

A Training Matrix has been developed that clearly shows the competencies necessary to fulfil the duties of each operational role available. Competencies remain valid for a period of 2 years, after which they are renewed. Renewal doesn't necessarily mean re-training --- a "refresher exam" may be all that is required.

Up and coming training courses currently planned are as follows –





- Tue 31st May Safely Access the Rail Corridor (SARC)
- Tue 26th July General Operational Safety & Carriage Attendant
- Sat 6th August Safely Access the Rail Corridor (SARC)
- Tue 16th August Testing of Trains (braking systems)

Additional to these, the practical component of the Shunting Theory course already conducted will be completed over time with those members requiring assessment, as rolling stock maintenance schedules permit.

The schedule above is naturally subject to variation dependent on the number of interested members. Please register your intention to attend to **Peter Burkitt** as soon as you can to assist in accurate planning.

There is currently **no charge** to members for this training, except for SARC which attracts a \$30 fee per member to attain a new Rail Safety Worker ID card from Queensland Rail (if required).

Courses commence at **8:30 am sharp** and are held on-site at Drayton. They involve "classroom" style presentations with some practical demonstrations where necessary and are completed by a written exam.

Members can contact **Peter Burkitt** (Operations Training Manager) at any time to discuss specific options for obtaining the competencies required.

Railmotor DP13

DP13 is set to undergo a major facelift over the next few weeks, the sheeting for the rail motor was kindly donated by Mr Lionel Moore from Moore trailers. The aluminium roll is of a thicker gauge, making it easier to work with and will dampen the frame noise slightly.

The new tyres for the power bogie of the Rail motor have been ordered from South Africa and we should see delivery of them within the next 9-10 weeks, these will be heat shrink finish that will be ready to press on the driving and leading wheel. The majority of the work is now finished on the 6LW engine, with a seal being replaced on the fluid coupling, a minor repair to the thermostat and design and fitting of the alternator. Attention has now turned to the 24 volt electrical system, aiming to bring the rail motor back to 'life' by the end of July. This will include the wiring of the headlights, cabin lights, control desks as well as ancillary

outlets for radios etc. Be sure to keep your eyes on the rail motor over the next few months during this exciting and busy time.
